RESEARCH

Dissertation: "The *Liverpool Mercury*, the Voice of Middle-Class Reform 1811-1820." This was an analysis of ten years of a weekly newspaper that served as both a source of general news and as a vehicle for the Reform movement in Liverpool. Though rarely mentioned in the historiography, the *Liverpool Mercury* was well known in its time and took the lead in shaping politics in England's second largest city during the tumultuous period that included, not only the Luddite rebellion, but the Napoleonic Wars, The War of 1812 and Britain's first wave of middle-class reform. The analysis focused on the contest to control the public sphere in order to shape the outcome of both local and national politics. It analyzes how the journalism of the *Liverpool Mercury* created and shaped a specific middle-class identity and ideology. To my knowledge, this is the only complete textual analysis of a British nineteenth century newspaper ever done.
